AWARDS

POLAR BEAR SWIM

Individuals who attend the Polar Bear Swim both days, will be able to purchase a patch at the Trading Post after completion.

MILE SWIM AWARD

Scouts who complete the Mile Swim are eligible to purchase an award patch at the Trading Post by showing their completion card.

AQUATICS

NOTES

SWIM CHECKS

Due to weather emergencies on Sunday, swim checks may be postponed to Monday. We will make every attempt to complete swim checks before the first Merit Badge class session. Individuals not wishing to take part in aquatics activities throughout the week do not need to take the swim checks. If a Scout is uneasy in water, please speak with our lifeguards and they can arrange to work with Scouts during the week to acclimate them to the water and help increase their swimming ability. If a unit chooses, it may conduct swim checks prior to coming to summer camp by following the procedures detailed in the Unit Swim Classification Record and Instructions.

LIFESAVING MERIT BADGE

Requirement 2a requires Scouts to have Swimming Merit Badge **BEFORE** beginning Lifesaving Merit Badge. SCOUTS THAT SHOW UP TO LIFESAVING MERIT BADGE AND DO NOT HAVE SWIMMING MERIT BADGE WILL BE REQUIRED TO PICK ANOTHER BADGE AT CAMP.

ADULT VOLUNTEERS

Leaders who can lend a helping hand during Open Swim and Open Boating at the Lake are always welcome. Please volunteer to help with life jackets and boats anytime. We will make sure you get wet!

SWIMWEAR POLICY

Swimwear should be comfortable, functional, and appropriate for camp. Swimwear should be secure enough not to shift or fall off while participating in aquatics activities and events. T-shirts or additional layers are allowed if they do not hamper movement in the water.





ATV ADVENTURE

PROGRAMS

ATV RIDING COURSE Weeklong Course

Become a part of the ATV Safety Institute of America (ASI) Safe Rider Coalition. As a part of this program, you will complete several trail rides, practice tread lightly skills, complete a conservation trail project, and earn the ASI rider course certification. Registrations are managed through the merit badge portal.

ATV OUTPOST

Thurs, 5:00-8:00 pm, Depart from ATV Field

Only for Scouts that have taken the ATV Program in a past Summer. Involves over 2 hours of trail riding. **OUTPOST HAS A \$10.00 COST.** Participants must provide a valid ASI Training Certificate. Please wear proper clothing including a long-sleeved shirt, long pants, and boots that cover the ankle. Dinner is included. Sign-up at Frontier HQ.



NOTES

ATV E-COURSE REQUIREMENTS

All Scouts who are registered to take the ATV riding course must complete an online e-course **BEFORE ARRIVING AT CAMP.** The e-course is free and can be found at atvsafety.org/atv-ecourse/. Be sure to bring a copy of your completion certificate to turn in on the first day of class.

PERMISSION FORMS

Permission Forms can be downloaded from www.PSRweb.org, a parent's signature is required, and MUST be turned in by the Pre-Camp Leaders meeting. Permission Forms are required for both the ATV Riding Course and the ATV Outpost.

CLASS SIZES

Class size is limited. There is a limit of 4 under-16-year-old Scouts in each class and a limit of 8 total Scouts per class.

PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT AND CLOTHING

All scouts must wear long pants, long sleeves, boots that cover the ankle, and a bandana (for helmet liner). Scouts that do not bring all the required clothing above will not be permitted to ride.

REFUND POLICY

Be sure to bring all required equipment on the first day as you are on the ATV right away. If a Scout misses a class, they cannot catch up and will be removed from the class without a refund.

PROGRAMS

LOW COPE

Mon, 7:15-9:00 pm

Consists of different challenges for groups of Scouts that involve teamwork and problem-solving. You must wear long pants to participate. Must have at least 6, preferably 8 people to run the course. Sign up at Frontier HQ.

HIGH COPE

Tues, 7:15-9:00 pm

Climb in the air and traverse challenging obstacles before leaving the course via zipline. You must be 13 years of age to participate and wear long pants. Must have at least 6, preferably 8 people to run the course. Sign up at Frontier HQ.



FLYING SQUIRREL

Wed, 6:00-7:00 pm, at the High COPE Course

Get a great view of PSR from over 40 feet. A minimum of 8 people are required.

NIGHT CLIMB

Thurs, 9:00-10:00 pm at the Tower

SPAR POLE CLIMB

Thurs, 3:00-5:00 pm at the Tower

Use special equipment to climb a pole 30ft in the air.

CLIMBING MERIT BADGE

Climbing Merit Badge students **MUST** come to open climbing to do their required climbing and rappelling.



ECOLOGY

AWARDS

BIG FISH CONTEST

Awarded to the Scout who catches the largest fish (length) while at camp. Measure and release your fish with a note from your Scoutmaster or bring the fish to Ecology during open area.

NOTES

FISHING POLES AND BAIT

Poles can be obtained from the Quartermaster. Except for individuals taking Fishing Merit Badge, the poles should be returned after one day's use. Individuals will be responsible for broken rods or reels. All poles must be turned in by Friday at 5:00 pm or they will be charged. Bait is available at the Trading Post at our cost.

SERVICE PROJECTS

The Ecology Area maintains a list of projects that Troops may undertake for their Baden Powell Award. Sign up for a project with the quartermaster Monday or Tuesday.

COMPOSTING AT PSR

The compost frame is located just east of the Seaton Ecology Pavilion. We will accept all vegetables, vegetable peelings, and fruits. Bread and bread products may be composted if soaked in water (it keeps the critters away). No meat, dairy, eggs, or eggshells (attracts skunks). The best time to visit Ecology with your compost is after evening flags.

ASTRONOMY MERIT BADGE

Three nights of hour-long observations are required at the telescopes across from the ATV field or complete 7b before camp. For prerequisites 4(c) and 6(b) please use the forms and follow the instructions found on the PSR web page https://www.PSRweb.org/prsheets. For prerequisite 8(a) the report on the planetarium attended needs to be detailed.

FISHING MERIT BADGE

It is preferred that Scouts bring their own fishing poles. Poles are available for those who need them. Bait is available at the Trading Post at our cost.

FLY FISHING MERIT BADGE

equipment is provided to individuals who have paid the fee for the Merit Badge. This equipment is the responsibility of the Scout and must be returned in good condition by the end of the week. The fee for a broken Rod is \$60 and the fee for a broken or missing reel is \$50.

SUSTAINABILITY MERIT BADGE

this is an introduction to the Merit Badge and only covers requirements 3, 6 and background information for requirement 4. SCOUT MUST HAVE COMPLETED REQUIREMENT #1 BEFORE COMING TO CAMP. SCOUT WILL NOT BE ABLE TO TAKE MERIT BADGE AT CAMP IF REQUIREMENT #1 IS NOT COMPLETE.

NOTES

PERSONAL FITNESS MERIT BADGE

This Merit Badge **CANNOT** be completed entirely at camp. Scouts should come to camp with all prerequisites done, including a 12-week Personal Fitness program. Otherwise, this program is meant to get Scouts started on the Merit Badge while providing them with proper instructions on Personal Fitness. Scouts are required to wear proper clothing for exercising including tennis shoes and athletic clothes.

CYCLING MERIT BADGE

The Merit Badge is open to all Scouts **HOWEVER IT CANNOT BE COMPLETED AT CAMP**. This program is meant for Scouts to get started while providing them with proper instruction on cycling. Scouts are required to wear proper clothing, including light-colored shirts. The outpost is **REQUIRED** for the Merit Badge.

GOLF MERIT BADGE

This Merit Badge is open to all; however previous golf experience is extremely helpful. We will leave on Tuesday morning to go play 9 holes at a local course; you will miss your 10 and 11:00 am Merit Badges while at the golf outpost. **PLEASE MAKE YOUR COUNSELORS ARE AWARE THAT YOU WILL NEED TO DO MAKEUP WORK.** Bring your own golf clubs and balls.

HANDICRAFTS

BOONDOGGLE WEAVING Mon, 7:15-8:15 pm

Weave your own keychain. Pay for supplies ahead of time at the Trading Post.

LEATHER BELT/BRACELET MAKING Tues, 7:15-8:15 pm

Design and make your own leather belt or bracelet. Pay for supplies ahead of time at the Trading Post.

T-shirts can be purchased at the Trading Post or bring one you already own. If bringing your own shirt, it must be clean and dry.

THE BOB ROSS AWARD

Awarded to a Scout who has shown superior involvement in the area by participating in Merit Badges, open area programs, and helping out around the area.

HUNTING LAWS

If you are not from Ohio or Michigan, please bring a copy of the hunting laws in your state for all merit badges.

RIFLE SHOOTING MERIT BADGE

Scouts must be 12 years old to take Rifle Shooting Merit Badge and to shoot during open times.

SHOTGUN SHOOTING MERIT BADGE

Scouts must be 12 years old to take Shotgun Shooting Merit Badge and to shoot during open times.

MERIT BADGES AT CAMP

MERIT BADGE FEES

Some merit badges and activities that require extra materials will have additional fees. Fees will be charged on a unit level and detailed in their invoice. For info on what merit badges and activities have fees and their amounts see pages 46-47.

MERIT BADGE PREREQUISITES

Prerequisites are requirements that cannot be completed at camp due to time constraints, location restraints, or other circumstances. Scouts who do not complete the prerequisites before coming to camp will not complete the Merit Badge at camp. Scouts should read Merit Badge books before coming to camp.

THERE ARE THREE TYPES OF PREREQUISITE CATEGORIES

ACTIVITY PARTICIPATION

This is a requirement that asks the Scout to **ATTEND AN EVENT, ACTIVITY, OR VISIT A LOCATION**. Examples would be participating on a sports team, visit your state capital, or take a year of a foreign language. Either a Scoutmaster or parent can verify these with a signed note and proof of the completed requirement.

ACTIVITY PARTICIPATION WITH ACTION

This is a requirement that asks the Scout to **DO SOMETHING** and then have the counselor **EVALUATE IT**. Examples would be "conduct a home safety audit" or "conduct a home fire drill" or "collect 10 insects and properly identify them" For proving these types of requirements, a note will not do. The Scout should bring with them whatever they needed to do, whether it is a rock collection, a copy of a letter to your congressperson, or a budget for three months. Sometimes items are not easily brought, i.e. fish; in that circumstance, a picture of you with the fish is satisfactory with a note from the parent or Scoutmaster.

PAPERWORK

This is a requirement that asks you to either **WRITE** or **DRAW** something. Examples would be reports for Environmental Science, drawing a home escape plan, or write a 500-word report on a book about mammals. This paper needs to be brought to camp for the Scout to show to the counselor.

A NOTE ON PLAGIARISM

There are several merit badges where the Scouts are required to prepare reports on various topics. Except where the requirements indicate that the paper is to be based on the Scout's own observation and empirical research conducted by the Scout, we anticipate that the Scouts will use published and online resources in the preparation of the reports. The reports which the Scouts prepare frequently are going to approximate the structure and content of the published material. That is permissible. The report is to be in the Scout's own words, thus it is impermissible to simply directly copy material from one or several sources and present that as the report.

If you have anyone that is considering camp staff, please let our Program Director know so they may have a conversation with them before they leave camp. Applications can be acquired at check out from the Program Director or apply online at www.psrweb.org/staffapp.

COUNSELOR IN TRAINING (CIT) PROGRAM

Many of our current staff members have been trained through our CIT Program. The CIT Program is open to Scouts/Venturers who are 14 years of age or older. The same staff applications may be used. Upon selection, they will be scheduled for their first week. While at camp, they will spend time in each of the program areas to get an overall view of the camp's operations. Over the course of their week, their performance will be evaluated, and they may be invited back for a second week. There is no fee involved in this program, and they may work on one Merit Badge for the week while a CIT with permission of the Program Director. Scouts may not be a CIT the week their Troop is at camp. CIT's are encouraged to attend staff week, June 5-14, 2024.

VOLUNTEER STAFF

GOOD TURN SCHOLARSHIP

The leadership of Camp Frontier has identified a need to recruit and retain the amazing staff that serves our Scouts every summer. The Good Turn Scholarship Program is one method of doing just that. The proceeds from soda and popcorn sales during opening and closing campfires go into a separate fund that will pay out over \$5,000 in scholarships each summer to our Frontier staff seeking higher education.

STAFF CONCERNS

If you observe inappropriate behavior or unsafe acts by anyone on staff, please report this to the Camp Director immediately so that the person can be coached and/or counseled. It may be that what they were doing was appropriate with the information they knew at the time. 
